GENERAL MEETING FUN, FUNKY FIBERS

At the March 2024 DFA General Meeting, Nancy K. did a presentation on weaving tapestries. She showed a video of a fiber artist that does this to illustrate some of the techniques. THEN, the fun began! There were boxes and boxes of various kinds of fiber, yarn, specialty yarns, etc. etc. Each person got a small loom that Nancy had pre-warped for us including various tools of the trade. (My favorite was the dinner fork used to mash down the woven fiber.) Everyone had a blast sorting through all the yarn and fibers for ones they wanted in their creation. We weren't able to finish during the short time we had, but we were able to take enough fibers AND THE Fork to finish the creation at home. We even got to keep the loom! I have not done any weaving and, although excited to try it, wasn't sure it would be a technique I would continue. I am thrilled with my creation and think it turned out great. In addition to the various fibers I added a copper wire wrapped piece of beach glass with crystals and completed the tapestry using the warp strings and more copper wire wrapping to create a hanging loop. Thank you, Nancy for a great time and wonderful opportunity to try a new art form.

Vegan Chocolate Pudding With Cinnamon and Chile Recipe

INGREDIENTS

Yield: 4 to 6 servings

34 cup sugar

1 pound silken tofu

8 ounces high-quality bittersweet or semisweet chocolate, melted

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

11/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon

½ teaspoon chile powder, or more to taste

Chocolate shavings (optional)

PREPARATION

Step 1

In a small pot, combine sugar with ¾ cup water; bring to a boil and cook until sugar is dissolved, stirring occasionally. Cool slightly.

Step 2

Put all ingredients except for chocolate shavings in a blender and purée until completely smooth, stopping machine to scrape down its sides if necessary. Divide among 4 to 6 ramekins and chill for at least 30 minutes. If you like, garnish with




