

My weaving took a detour for several years and I have had the joy of pouring into my grandchildren. I have recently been able to get back to my rigid heddle study group and I am in the process of warping my rug loom in hopes of having rugs for the fall sale and Christmas

FLOCK AND FIBER FESTIVAL, SEATTLE AUGUST 10-11, 2024 By Shelley Tanner



I was excited to attend the 2nd Annual Flock and Fiber Festival in Seattle, August 10-11. The festival, founded by the owner of La Mercerie yarn shop (Bainbridge Island), was held in the Seattle Convention Center Summit Building which is a beautiful new facility about one block north of the main Convention Center

facilities.

The marketplace was open and airy with alot of windows letting in the natural light.

Masks were required for the first 2 hrs of the Marketplace each day to allow those not comfortable without masking to attend. Saturday was the busier of the two days in the Marketplace, but there was still plenty of yarn to enjoy on Sunday. There were 102 booths in the Marketplace from all over the US and from Canada and the UK. Those yarns and shops that might be familiar included Madelinetosh, Spincycle, Starlight Knitting Society (Portland, OR), Della !, and Purl2 (shop recentlry closed in Walla Walla). Some booths included multiple yarn dyers. For example, The La Mercerie booth included yarns from Magpie Fibers, Sonder Yarn Co. and La Bien Aimee.

One of my favorite booths was the Pacific Knit Co. Booth. If you are not familiar with Jamie's mix-and-match colorwork designs and her Doodle decks, you may want to check out her Instagram or her website: pacificknitco.com. Jamie shared the booth with two yarn dyers and there were knitwear samples from each dyer that showed off Jamie's designs beautifully and provided knitters with inspiration for their own projects.

I saw and squished alot of yarn both Saturday and Sunday but kept my purchases down to the following since I already have many projects lined up using yarn in my stash. I bought Les Garcons British DK in Carmen's Story (purple), Abador's Waters (blue) and Meredith's Grey (gray) and Fluff (baby alpaca, fine merino, mulberry silk and yak) in English Rose (pink) from Les Garcons (Montreal, Quebec) to make a Melmerby by Maxim Cyr (a linen stitch cowl lined in fluff) and a Ikigai Fibers Paka Washi yarn kit in the colors shown (Chartreuse (bright green), Smudge (charcoal), Pacific (light blue) and Salt (white) to make a Troy hat and cowl from A. Opie


We ran out of grand champion ribbons - but thought this one fit better anyways. It is knit from fiber spun from Rebecca's dog, Lad.

RIGID HEDDLE



Recently Betty Davenport, a founder and member of Desert Fiber Arts (DFA) guild, was sponsored by DFA and interviewed via ZOOM on Handweavers Guild of America (HGA)

Textiles and Tea Program. Betty spoke about her career in weaving as well as the books she had written, one of which was Hands on Rigid Heddle Weaving. During the 1980's, Betty lived in Richland, WA. She was and continues to be a member of DFA.

At our Rigid Heddle Study Group meeting, August 12, we had a "Blast from the Past!" Dorothy Mucha brought the project she had woven according to Betty Davenport's design and directions for a transparency inlay project. It was photographed for Betty's book Hands on Rigid Heddle Weaving, published in 1987. (See photo.) The poinsettia inlay is woven in wool on a linen plain weave background. Detailed instructions for the transparency inlay are given in Betty's book. Dorothy hangs this weaving in a window to allow light to come through the transparent background to show off the inlay design.

Epilogue: DFA's current RHSG has been inspired to revisit the transparent inlay

BASKETRY

Bessie Bill joined the basket group to share her knowledge and skill in making Wa'paas Baskets. Wa'paas Baskets, also known as Sally bags, are traditional Native American woven baskets used for gathering. Bessie shared her story, history and culture in our afternoon together. The anxious group of 20 students were excited to learn. Bessie had us all do step one of making our baskets, then stopped and did breathing to relax and recenter the group. We learned the "belly button" start. The room was tense as we learned our technique, then a calm came over the room. We became a "Weaving Group" chattering, laughing and learning. Wa'paas Baskets are baskets woven with fiber and can be worked on anywhere. So much easier on the hands, plus transportable!

We are hoping to have Bessie come back and join us in March or April for another class. Contact Marion if you are interested in attending a Wa'paas Basketry class.
